Kakaako Business Plan – Jerris Hedges	Retaining NCI designation is first and foremost for the campus, community and all. Diminishing the Cancer Center (CC) would diminish overall effectiveness as a unit.	
	Outlined in the plan are more efficient ways to operate as a combined Kakaako campus.	
	3 scenarios have been outlined: one retaining the NCI designation, and two scenarios should the designation be lost.	
	One reason for the need of a business plan has been the decline of state legislative dollars.	
	The "Hale" Model	
	Nancy provided some slides on current and proposed business plan financials. Mentioned employee attrition as a reality moving forward. Nancy briefly talked about the significant loss of federal and external monies into the state should the CC lose its NCI designation, as well as, an alternative break-even budget with continued cigarette-tax monies from the HI legislature. Alternative options have been considered including: private-public partnerships, selling/leasing the building, changing bonds, etc. but there are interrelated legal issues.	
	The Dean concluded with the need for the campus within the community and on a statewide and federal level; that the loss of	

	either the CC or JABSOM would truly be detrimental to Hawaii. The campus has done amazing things in terms of academics, service and revenue to the economy. Emphasis should also be placed on our networks to the hospitals and community and our successful rankings despite our slim resources.	
50 th Anniversary Gala Update – Elaine Evans	97/100 tables have been sold to date, with an increase of up to 125 tables possible. The Gala is still four months out and more sales can be made. Alumni and the health care systems have been strong supporters; Dan Meisenzahl will be the emcee, and Jake Shimabukuro will perform.	
Match Day Results – Richard Smerz	 Dr. Smerz outlined the results of Match Day: 65/66 students matched to programs 22 of those 65 will stay in Hawaii and some will be transitional residents Internal medicine had the most residents Roughly 50% of the class is going into a primary care specialty Higher numbers of surgical specialties than in the past; 1 neurosurgery; 3 orthopedics; 1 plastic surgery California was 1st choice for residency, Hawaii 2nd, New York 3rd Dr. Smerz concluded with a brief explanation of the match process, and thanks to the faculty who contributed to the students' education.
