



Gregory G Maskarinec is a cultural anthropologist who has taught for nearly twenty years in the Departments of Native Hawaiian Health and Family Medicine and Community Health at the John A. Burns School of Medicine, University of Hawai'i.

He has conducted research on traditional medicine, medical education, and contemporary medical systems in Nepal, Bangladesh, Kyrgyzstan, Uzbekistan, Palau, American Samoa, the Federated States of Micronesia (Yap, Chuuk, Pohnpei and Kosrae) and the Republic of the Marshall Islands as well as in Hawai'i and the continental United States (Arkansas).

The author of several books and many articles, his work on Nepal has been honored, on the recommendation of the Nepal Royal Academy, with the "Birendra Pragyalankar" from the late King of Nepal, Birendra Bir Bikram Shah Dev, and with a "Vidhyadhari," Honorary degree of Sanskritic Scholarship, awarded by the late Yogi Naraharinath. He is an affiliate scholar of the Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique (CNRS, Paris), has twice received Senior Fulbright Awards, and has taught as a visiting professor at Tribhuvan University, Kathmandu (Nepal); Asian University for Women, Chittagong (Bangladesh); University of Paris X (Nanterre); and the University of Zürich (Switzerland).

In 2016 he was given the "National Honor - 2016 Award" from the Nepal literary organization "Nepal Sahitya dot com," honoring his lifetime commitment to Nepali language and literature.
